CAREFULLY READ ALL RULES

ENTRIES

1. Competition is open to the world except where otherwise stated.
2. Entries will be submitted online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/. See specific divisions for entry deadlines. Entries must be submitted online by 11:59 p.m. (AZ time) of the deadline indicated. Where allowed, entries and DNA kits submitted through the Arizona National Livestock Show Office must be received in the Arizona National Livestock Show Office on or before the deadline as printed **OR** must be postmarked by a U.S. Post Office on or before the deadline **AND** received in the Arizona National Livestock Show Office within seven (7) days of the deadline. Metered postmarks are **NOT ACCEPTABLE** for entries received after the deadline. Use of mail tracking services are strongly recommended.
3. Entry and other fees are due at the time of entry unless otherwise stated. Entry and other fees paid online may be subject to a 4% credit card transaction fee.
4. Refunds will be allowed prior to the posted entry deadline, less a 15% office fee. Entries declined due to lack of required information may not receive a refund.
5. The Arizona National Livestock Show Committee reserves the right to accept or reject any entry or application, to limit entries to available facilities, and to limit the number of entries by an exhibitor.

6. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by Arizona National Livestock Show for violation of show rules, policies and procedures without recourse against the Arizona National Livestock Show. Disciplinary action may include disqualification, withholding of premiums, sale proceeds or awards, fines, prohibition from future participation and/or reporting violations to government agencies or other fairs and livestock shows.
7. A Bill of Sale may be requested during the Arizona National Livestock Show.
8. The Arizona National reserves the right to return entries and cancel any division or class in which, in its judgement, the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition.
9. The Arizona National is not responsible for lost mail or mailing delays.

INTERPRETATION

10. The Arizona National Livestock Show Executive Committee reserves the final and absolute right to interpret all rules and regulations, arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard to or arising out of or connected with the Arizona National Livestock Show, and the right to amend or to add to these rules as it is determined necessary. An exhibitor who violates any of the rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and will be subject to such

penalty as the Executive Committee may order.

11. The Arizona National Livestock Show assumes no responsibility for the correctness of any description given in the Premium Book. All interpretation will be based on the most recent version date.
12. Please note that many times within this premium book and on the website, the Arizona National Livestock Show is referred to as "Arizona National". In all cases the listings refer to the Arizona National Livestock Show.

LIABILITY

13. All exhibitors will be under the control and direction of the Show Management but Arizona National Livestock Show, Inc. or its officers, directors, agents, or employees or the Arizona State Fair and Exposition Center or its officers, directors, agents or employees will in no case be responsible for any loss, injury or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage that may occur to him or his officers, agents, employees, or animals during the Arizona National Livestock Show.
14. The exhibitor shall indemnify the Arizona National Livestock Show against any and all legal proceedings in regard to the above and against damage or injury to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor, his officers, agents, employees or animals.

CHECKS, SERVICE FEES

15. A 4% transaction fee may be charged for credit card payments.
16. A \$50 service fee will be charged on all returned checks.
17. Returned checks must be replaced with cash or money order before entries are shown and premiums will be paid.
18. A late fee of 1% per month will be charged on all accounts not paid within 30 days.

19. The Arizona National Livestock Show is not able to cash checks.

CONDUCT

20. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, livestock show management, volunteers, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
21. Only animals participating in the Arizona National Livestock Show are permitted to be on the fairgrounds during the Arizona National Livestock Show unless approved and arranged for specific purposes by the Executive Director.
22. Animals at the Arizona National Livestock Show will be treated in accordance with all local and state regulations and any mistreatment or ill-treatment of these animals may result in a cancellation of this agreement.
23. Exhibitors are expected to properly care for their animals and to maintain the cleanliness and orderliness of their animals, stalls and pens. Department Superintendents will notify exhibitors of improper care or inappropriate treatment. The Superintendent or Director of Livestock, in concurrence with the Executive Director, may disqualify the animal(s) and require immediate removal from the grounds if improper care or inappropriate treatment continues after notification.
24. Stalls, pens and aisles must be cleaned by 7:30 a.m. daily.
25. Public aisles and walkways must remain clear of tack, chairs, equipment and animals.

UNETHICALLY FITTED/REPRESENTED LIVESTOCK

26. Unethical Fitting is hereafter defined as the altering or changing of the natural appearance, weight, musculature or conformation of an animal in an unnatural or artificial manner.
27. Unethical Fitting includes, but is not limited to the following:
- Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, internally or externally, with an irritant, counterirritant, or other substance to temporarily improve conformation.
 - Minimizing the effects of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs and depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment except normal exercise.
 - Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or switching of the tail.
 - Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area.
 - Surgery or other practices performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide, or feet (this is to include any materials added to the feet of an animal) except the removal of warts or horns and the permitted clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.
 - Insertion of foreign material under the skin.
 - Changing the color of hair at any point, spot or area on the animal's body (e.g. white hair may not be painted black).
 - The use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
 - The use of diuretics.
 - Administration of an illegal, un-approved, or performance enhancing drug internally or externally.
 - The addition of any hair or hair like material to an animal's body will not be permitted, except for tail heads or

false tail switches on cattle and hair on goat legs.

28. Exhibitor specifically represents that no animal entered by him/her is unethically fitted and that the date of birth is correctly stated.

JUDGES

29. The reputation and ability of a judge is considered during the selection process. Judges may have to explain their placings. This is part of the educational process which assists exhibitors and livestock producers to improve their stock.
30. The decisions of judges are final. The judge's decision cannot be protested. When fraud, misrepresentation, error or collusion is discovered, the Show Management or appointed referee may change final placement.

PROTESTS

31. A written protest with signature(s) must be delivered to the appropriate Department Superintendent within six (6) hours of a protested occurrence. Department Superintendent will immediately notify Executive Director of Protest. A \$250 deposit (cash, certified check or money order), must accompany the protest. The deposit will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests will be adjudicated by the Executive Committee; whose decision is final. A protest may only be submitted based on a violation of rules during the show.

PARADES AND CONTESTS

32. Exhibitors must ascertain when their livestock will be judged. Animals must be in the ring promptly after being called. Exhibitors failing to comply with this rule may have their animals excluded from competition.
33. If an exhibitor chooses not to show an animal in a class, he/she must notify the Division Superintendent before the class is called.

34. Exhibitors may be asked to parade their animal by the Show Management.
35. Exhibitors and their livestock which qualify to compete for any Grand or Reserve Champion selection must participate in these judging's as scheduled. Exhibitors that do not participate will forfeit all awards and premiums in addition to further sanctions as deemed necessary.
36. In order to provide meaningful livestock judging contests, Show Management reserves the right to select exhibitor's animals for use in such contests.

PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

37. Premiums and awards are stated in the Rules and Regulations of specific Divisions.
38. Arizona National Livestock Show may apply premium proceeds to amounts owed by an exhibitor, owner or their immediate family members. If such amounts owed are deducted from premium proceeds, a \$25.00 administrative fee may also be deducted. Premiums will be paid as soon as possible after the Arizona National Livestock Show.
39. If premiums are not received by February 28, please contact the Arizona National Livestock Show office. Premium checks are made out to the owner as named on the entry. Total premiums of \$600 or more to any individual will be paid only after the Arizona National receives a completed IRS Form W-9. Checks not cashed within sixty (60) days of the date of issue are void and may not be reissued.
40. Judges shall award first, second, third, etc. places according to merit; if without merit, the judge shall make no award under any circumstances. This rule applies whether there are one or more entries in a class.

ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES

41. All livestock may be individually inspected by show veterinarians or show officials before entering the show grounds.

Livestock Officials may inspect paperwork prior to and after any auction.

42. Upon arrival, all livestock exhibitors are to report to the appropriate barn office to turn in any required paperwork including but not limited to health, registration and inspection papers. Exhibitor packets containing pertinent show information, items purchased and show back tags will be distributed.
43. Release will be 6:00 p.m.- 6:00 a.m. daily.
44. Any animals abandoned at the Arizona National Livestock Show will be handled at the discretion of the Executive Director and Show Management. The animal may be sold to a packer. If the exhibitor is later located, the exhibitor will receive market price minus a 20% commission fee or a \$100 fine, whichever is the greater amount. If the exhibitor cannot be located, the Arizona National Livestock Show will keep the money.

SIGNAGE

45. No signage larger than 8"x10" may be displayed without Show Management approval.

CATTLE BLOCKING CHUTES

46. Cattle blocking chute permits cost \$35 each and can be purchased online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/. Blocking chute permits are issued at check-in. Blocking chute permits may be purchased at the show for \$50 each from the Arizona National Guest Services Booth. Blocking chutes are restricted to designated areas and must have the permit attached. Blocking chutes are **NOT** allowed in the cattle tie-outs. **No blocking chutes may be set-up in traffic areas until load-in is complete.** Blocking chutes without the Arizona National Livestock Show permit may be confiscated.
47. Exhibitors are encouraged to cooperate with each other to utilize available blocking chutes.

ELECTRICAL GENERATORS AND EQUIPMENT

48. All fans, blowers, hand clippers and other electrical appliances must be equipped with a ground wire. Use of electrical appliances is limited to plug-in outlets provided in stalls and blocking chute areas. Removal of light bulbs from any outlet is prohibited. Stapling, attaching or extending an extension cord in an unsafe manner is prohibited.
49. Electric power is limited in all barns and buildings. Blowers and clippers may not be operated inside the Junior Cattle Barns.
50. Portable electric generators whether owned, rented or borrowed, which are operated by an exhibitor at the Arizona National Livestock Show, must be equipped with Ground Fault Interrupter (G.F.I.) outlets. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
51. Use of electrical appliances and hookups may be inspected by the Show Electrician. Violations may result in the confiscation of any such extension cord(s) and/or appliance(s).
52. All generators and propane heaters will be placed in established areas. Significant fines and/or confiscation by the Fire Marshall may be imposed on violators.

MUZZLES

53. Exhibitors may use mesh or plastic muzzles. Style must allow the animal the ability to drink water.

STALLING/FITTING/PUBLIC AREAS

54. All livestock will be housed in designated areas. All fitting areas are designated and fitting is not allowed outside of these spaces.
55. All pathways, building entrances and exits, pedestrian areas and approaches must be kept clear for the safety and convenience of all persons and livestock. All fans, tack, equipment, chairs, feed, supplies, blocking chutes and tables must be kept within stalls, tie space, pens and designated tack areas. Fitting equipment and activity must take place in designated areas.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Sheep/Goat Barn: Tack pens will not be available. There will be a limited number of 10' x 10' indoor fitting spaces available for \$100/each (85 spaces). First come first served. Sheep/Goat tack spaces can be purchased online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/. Exhibitors may use outdoor space to fit.

Swine Barn: Tack pens will not be available. All tack must be kept off the floor and out of aisle ways. Tack may be stored above the pen on surfaces provided by the show.

56. All representatives of the Arizona National Livestock Show and all Arizona National Livestock Show exhibitors **MUST** adhere to any and all Fire Marshall requirements.

DOGS

57. Dogs must be kept on a leash at all times. Dogs that show aggression must be removed from the grounds immediately. Animal Control will be contacted if necessary.

PHOTOGRAPHS/VIDEO

58. The Arizona National Livestock Show reserves the right to use any and all photographs and videos taken during the show for publicity purposes. By entering the show grounds, you agree that your image can be used to promote the Arizona National Livestock Show.

BEDDING

59. The Feed Store, (offering shavings, bedding pellets, straw and hay only) will operate during the Arizona National Livestock Show. Feed Store purchases can be made at the Arizona National Guest Services Booth. Cash and credit cards only.

GROUND ACCESS AND PARKING

60. Trailer staging will begin at 12:01 a.m. on December 27 in the 20th Avenue Parking Lot (Staging Lot). Load in will occur from 6:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

61. **Early Bird Load-In** will be available on December 26 from 2:00-5:00 p.m. To take advantage of this premium service, there is a \$250 fee per trailer and can be purchased online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/. All animals and tack must be unloaded at this time, Early Bird is not available for unloading tack only.

Show Management reserves the right to close Early Bird Load-In entries prior to show deadline.

62. After unloading, livestock trailers must be parked in areas designated by Show Management. Free trailer parking will be available in a lot adjacent to the fairgrounds. Livestock trailer parking on grounds is available for a \$100 per trailer and can be purchased online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/.
63. There is no charge for vehicle parking on the fairgrounds.
64. Vehicles must park in designated areas.
65. No exhibitor vehicles may be inside the admission fence between 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. daily.
66. Improperly parked vehicles and trailers are subject to removal by the Show Management at owner's expense.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

67. Use of skateboards, roller blades, bicycles, scooters, mopeds, hoverboards and other similar modes of transportation is prohibited on the grounds at the Arizona National Livestock Show. Security is authorized to confiscate and hold these items until the end of the show.
68. No unauthorized golf carts will be allowed on grounds. Permits can be purchased from the Arizona National office for \$125 per cart and only licensed drivers are allowed to operate the cart. Electric or gas-powered carts are allowed, but must be governed. Arizona National reserves the right to limit the number of personal golf carts allowed on grounds.

SECURITY

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

69. All exhibitors will be responsible for the security and safety of their animals.

PUBLIC DISTURBANCES

70. Exhibitors or exhibitor's family members causing public disturbances, those who are uncooperative and/or unsportsmanlike, those not following good animal welfare practices as determined by management, or those found in violation of rules or in practices unethical or inimical with the Arizona National Livestock Show program and/or policies/procedures shall be penalized by forfeiture of premiums awarded and all awards, associated fines resulting from damages to State property shall be paid, and any privileges, and/or disqualification at the current or any subsequent Arizona National Livestock Show as may be deemed appropriate by the Show Committee. Further, if the exhibitor and/or exhibitor's adult supervisor, parent or family member's actions are deemed illegal, inhumane or unethical to livestock, the proper authorities will be notified for further investigation by those agencies for possible prosecution and/or civil penalties.

DRENCHING

71. Drenching, using humane practices, will be allowed with drench guns. The use of stomach pumps is prohibited.

THERAPEUTICS

72. The practice or use of any therapeutic application, including, but not limited to animal chiropractic services, acupuncture, kinesiology tape or electrical massage stimulations on show grounds is prohibited.

PUBLIC HEALTH

73. The Arizona National Livestock Show reserves the right to require the use of PPE during the event as advised by CDC and the Maricopa County Health Department.

74. No glass containers will be allowed in barns.

FORCE MAJEURE

75. In no event shall the Arizona National Livestock Show be responsible or liable for any failure or delay in the performance of its obligations hereunder arising out of or caused by, directly or indirectly, forces beyond its control, including, without limitation, strikes, work stoppages, accidents, acts of war or terrorism, civil or military disturbances, nuclear or natural catastrophes or acts of God, and interruptions, loss or malfunctions of

utilities, communications or computer (software and hardware) services; it being understood that the Arizona National Livestock Show shall use reasonable efforts which are consistent with accepted practices in the show industry to resume performance as soon as practicable under the circumstances.

PORTABLE TENTS

76. All portable tents will be set up within established boundaries, no propane heaters will be allowed inside of tents.





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ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

THE PHONE NUMBER FOR THE OFFICE OF THE ARIZONA STATE VETERINARIAN IS: 602-542-4293.

THE NATIONAL PREMISE IDENTIFICATION NUMBER FOR THE ARIZONA STATE FAIRGROUNDS IS: 005E 1E5.

This number may be needed for recording movement to, from or within some states under the federal rule on Animal Disease Traceability developed by the USDA.

In addition to the following Arizona National Livestock Show health requirements, all livestock moved into and within the state are subject to rules and regulations of the Arizona Department of Agriculture, which can be found at: http://apps.azsos.gov/public_services/Title_03/3-02.pdf. Contact the Office of the Arizona State Veterinarian at (602) 542-4293 or visit <https://agriculture.az.gov/animals/state-veterinarians-office> for additional requirements. **No animal may be entered in the Arizona National Livestock Show that is currently under quarantine for, or recently exposed to, infectious or contagious disease, or has mange, lice, ringworm, abscesses or ulcerations.**

BIOSECURITY

The Arizona National Livestock Show has initiated a Biosecurity Protocol for Livestock Health inspections and treatment policies related to general health concerns. This protocol will utilize Arizona licensed veterinary care and if necessary, removal of livestock that is determined to be a possible detriment to other livestock, exhibitors or the public. Animals may be removed at any time if they are deemed a health threat to exhibitors or other animals. Any livestock removed for health reasons will be a combined effort of the Show Veterinarian, the Director of Livestock and Show Management. Entry fees will not be refunded.

All Arizona National Livestock Show veterinary staff and their approved assistants are provided to ensure the health and well-being of all livestock as well as for the inspection of all health-related paperwork. Areas of concern for all species include but are not limited to are: wounds that are open or closed

that may be infectious, warts, active ringworm and fungus conditions, dysentery, pinkeye, lice, mites, foot rot, sore mouth, infectious pneumonia; abscesses which are balding, showing hair separation, open and draining. The Show Veterinarian shall determine when and if livestock must be treated or isolated.

SHOW VETERINARIAN POLICY

Livestock exhibitors will be responsible for all veterinary fees and services applied to their animals. The livestock veterinarian contracted by the Arizona National Livestock Show, will charge \$100 per CVI written at the show.

NECROPSY/ANIMAL HEALTH POLICY

The Show Veterinarian, at his/her sole discretion, can require a necropsy for any animal that may die while on the fairgrounds, the cost of the procedure will be borne by the Show. **If an exhibitor requests a necropsy, the procedure and removal of animal(s) will be done at the exhibitor's expense.**

CATTLE HEALTH AND BRAND INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS

Cattle are inspected by Show Officials before entering the fairgrounds. The Show Veterinarian reserves the right to require testing after entries are on the grounds and to order removal of animals not meeting health requirements or that pose a health threat to other animals.

OUT-OF-STATE CATTLE ENTRIES

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:** A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI; health certificate) issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days prior to arrival at the Arizona National Livestock Show is **REQUIRED**. One CVI per family/farm per specie. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must include the following:
 - Arizona Prior Entry Permit number
 - Individual identification for each animal using the Premise Identification number. A USDA metal ear tag or other approved National uniform ear tagging system, a registration tattoo number, or a registration brand from a breed association. Under the federal ADT law, all show cattle have to have official ID regardless of age:

 - Results of all required tests
 - Color, age and sex identification for each animal.
2. **Prior Entry Permit:** Before cattle may enter Arizona, a Prior Entry Permit must be obtained from the Office of the Arizona State Veterinarian at (602) 542-4293. Prior Entry Permits are issued no earlier than thirty (30) days prior to movement, and **AFTER** obtaining a health certificate (CVI).
3. **Brucellosis:** Except where noted under exceptions below, the following animals must be tested negative for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to arrival at the Arizona National Livestock Show:
 - All beef bulls that are over twelve (12) months of age;
 - All female beef cattle that are calf hood vaccinated (vaccinated for Brucellosis) and that are over eighteen (18) months of age; and
 - All female beef cattle that are not calf hood vaccinated (not vaccinated for Brucellosis) and that are over twelve (12) months of age.

Exceptions to the Brucellosis test: Steers are exempt as well as breeding cattle (bulls and females) from a certified Brucellosis free herd or native to a Brucellosis Class Free state. If cattle are from a certified Brucellosis free herd, the Herd Certification Number and last herd test date must be shown on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
4. **Tuberculosis:** All cattle three (3) months of age and over must be tested negative for Tuberculosis within sixty (60) days prior to arrival at the Show. Breeding beef cattle (bulls and females) from an accredited Tuberculosis free herd or a Tuberculosis free state, and steers are exempt from the Tuberculosis test requirement. If from an accredited Tuberculosis free herd, the Herd Accreditation Number and last herd test date must be shown on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

5. **Trichomoniasis:** Although bulls consigned to an exhibition are exempt from Trichomoniasis testing, any bull one year of age and older that remains in Arizona after the Arizona National Livestock Show must have been tested for *Tritrichomonas foetus* within thirty (30) days PRIOR to entry into the state. There are NO provisions for testing a bull during or after the Arizona National Livestock Show. Exception: Bulls entered in the Commercial Ranch Bull Show must be Trichomoniasis tested sixty (60) days prior to the show.

IN-STATE CATTLE ENTRIES

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:** A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI; health certificate) issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days prior to arrival at the Arizona National Livestock Show is **REQUIRED**. One CVI per family/farm per specie. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must include the following:
 - Individual identification for each animal using the Premise Identification number. A USDA metal ear tag or other approved National uniform ear tagging system, a registration tattoo number, or a registration brand from a breed association. Under the federal ADT law, all show cattle have to have official ID regardless of age: https://www.aphis.usda.gov/aphis/ourfocus/animalhealth/SA_Traceability. For further information regarding the National Ear tagging system, visit: https://www.aphis.usda.gov/traceability/downloads/ADT_eartags_criteria.pdf
 - Results of all required tests
 - Color, age and sex identification for each animal
2. **Arizona Department of Agriculture Inspection:** An Arizona Department of Agriculture Seasonal Pass is **REQUIRED** for all **junior** exhibitor entries originating in Arizona. A Seasonal Pass may be obtained by calling (602) 542-6407. The Seasonal Pass must list a complete description of each animal including any identification such as a USDA metal ear tag, an official National Animal Identification System ear tag, an electronic ear tag, a registration tattoo number, a registration brand from a breed association, or an Arizona registered brand. An Arizona Department of Agriculture Seasonal Pass is **NOT** required for **open cattle entries** originating in Arizona. If an Arizona junior exhibitor enters a heifer in both the open cattle and junior show, the exhibitor should follow Arizona Department of Agriculture rules regarding seasonal passes.
3. **Required Vaccinations for All Ranch Replacement Heifers:** All heifers entered and shown in the Ranch Replacement Heifer Division **MUST** be treated and in accordance with a VAC 45 program and proper documentation certifying compliance must be provided at check-in. All heifers **MUST** be calf hood vaccinated with an approved *Brucella abortis* RB-51 vaccine between 4-12 months of age. Official calf hood vaccination ID must be evident for all heifers and in compliance with federal and state regulations. All other Arizona National Livestock Show health rules and requirements apply.

SHEEP AND GOAT HEALTH AND INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS

Sheep and goats are inspected by Show Officials before entering the show grounds. The Show Veterinarian reserves the right to require testing after entries are on the grounds and to order removal of animals not meeting health requirements or that pose a health threat to other animals.

ALL SHEEP AND GOATS

1. **Identification:** Arizona National Livestock Show requires that **ALL** sheep and goats must have official scrapie identification tags. The Arizona National Livestock Show does **NOT** exempt neutered sheep and neutered goats (wethers) less than eighteen (18) months of age. Contact your state veterinarian for more information on official scrapie identification.

OUT-OF-STATE SHEEP AND GOAT ENTRIES

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:** A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI; health certificate) issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days prior to arrival at the show is **REQUIRED**. One CVI per family/farm per specie. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must include the following:
 - Arizona Prior Entry Permit number
 - Individual identification for each animal using the Premise identification number and the official scrapie identification tag for each animal
 - A statement that sheep and goats are not infected with bluetongue, not exposed to scrapie and do not originate from a scrapie infected or source flock
 - Color, age and sex identification for each animal
2. **Prior Entry Permit:** Before sheep or goats may enter Arizona, a Prior Entry Permit must be obtained from the Office of the Arizona State Veterinarian at (602) 542-4293. Prior Entry Permits are issued no earlier than thirty (30) days prior to movement, and **AFTER** obtaining a health certificate (CVI).

IN-STATE SHEEP AND GOAT ENTRIES

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:** A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI; health certificate) issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days prior to arrival at the show is **REQUIRED**. One CVI per family/farm per specie: The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must include the following:
 - Individual identification for each animal using the Premise identification number and the official scrapie identification tag for each animal
 - A statement that sheep and goats are not infected with bluetongue, not exposed to scrapie and do not originate from a scrapie infected or source flock
 - Color, age and sex identification for each animal
2. **Arizona Department of Agriculture Inspection:** All native Arizona sheep and goats **MUST** be accompanied by an Arizona Department of Agriculture Seasonal Pass. To obtain a Seasonal Pass, contact the Arizona Department of Agriculture at (602) 542-6407. The Seasonal Pass must list the official scrapie identification tag for each animal. Official scrapie identification tags are available from the U. S. Department of Agriculture free of charge by calling (505) 761-3160.

SWINE HEALTH AND INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS

All swine are inspected by Show Officials before entering the fairgrounds. The Show Veterinarian reserves the right to require testing after entries are on the grounds and to order removal of animals not meeting health requirements or that pose a health threat to other animals.

ALL SWINE

1. **Identification:** All swine must be individually and permanently identified with a Premise Identification Number, and **MUST** have secured in one ear, a tamper proof ear tag, imprinted with a nationally unique, official identification number that matches all paperwork submitted including health papers. The tag **MUST** possess the US shield emblem (i.e. 840 tag).

All swine must also be identified with an ear notch that conforms to the universal swine ear notch system. Ear notches must be completely healed. Premise identification and ear notches are required for entry. For a Premise identification number, contact the appropriate State Veterinarian or Department of Agriculture: <http://www.usaha.org/federal-and-state-animal-health>

Ear tag number and ear notch **MUST** be indicated and match on all health papers required.

OUT-OF-STATE SWINE ENTRIES

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:** A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI; health certificate) issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days prior to arrival at the Arizona National Livestock Show is **REQUIRED**. One CVI per family/farm per specie. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must include the following:
 - Arizona Prior Entry Permit Number
 - Individual identification for each animal using the Premise identification number and ear notches conforming to the universal swine ear notch system
 - A written statement on the Certificate is required stating that the swine have not been fed garbage and a statement that the swine have not been vaccinated for Pseudorabies
 - Color, age and sex identification for each animal
2. **Prior Entry Permit:** Before swine may enter Arizona, a Prior Entry Permit must be obtained from the Office of the Arizona State Veterinarian at (602) 542-4293. Prior Entry Permits are issued no earlier than thirty (30) days prior to movement, and **AFTER** obtaining a health certificate (CVI).

IN-STATE SWINE ENTRIES

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:** A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI; health certificate) issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days prior to the Arizona National Livestock Show is **REQUIRED**. One CVI per family/farm per specie. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must include the following:
 - Individual identification for each animal using the Premise identification number and ear notches conforming to the universal swine ear notch system
 - A written statement on the Certificate is required stating that the swine have not been fed garbage and a statement that the swine have not been vaccinated for Pseudorabies
 - Color, age and sex identification for each animal
2. **Arizona Department of Agriculture Inspection:** All native Arizona swine **MUST** be accompanied by an Arizona Department of Agriculture Seasonal Pass. To obtain a Seasonal Pass, contact the Arizona Department of Agriculture at (602) 542-6407.

OPEN CATTLE SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS

ALL GENERAL RULES, REGULATIONS AND CATTLE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS APPLY

ENTRIES

1. The Open Cattle entry deadline is **November 15. Entries must be submitted online.** See additional requirements in the *General Rules and Regulations* section. Entry fees for the Open Breeding Cattle divisions are:
 - **Individual Classes:** \$45.00, which includes use of a tie-out
 - **Group Classes:** No Fee
 - **Blocking Chute:** \$35.00
 - **Blocking Chute late:** \$35.00
2. Entries in non-sponsored divisions with less than eight (8) head at check-in may be transferred to the All Other Breeds division.
3. Entries may be limited based on available space.
4. **Late Fees:** late entries will be charged double the amount of entry fees.
Late blocking chute permits are \$50.00 each.
Show Management may decline any late entry without explanation.
5. The exhibitor must identify the specific breed of the entry when entering.
6. The breed registry, registered name of the animal and registration certificate number for each entry is required at the time of entry. The name and registration number of the sire and dam is also required. The original registration paper must be presented at check-in.
7. Exhibitors are required to email .pdf copies of registration papers to opencattle@anls.org by December 15.

SUBSTITUTIONS

8. Substitute entries are allowed within each breed on or before December 15, for a

\$25 fee. **NO EXCEPTIONS.** Email substitution information to information@anls.org. Substitution emails/faxes must include a copy of the substitute animal's registration papers and the complete identification of the animal being withdrawn. Original registration paperwork of substituted animal must be presented at check-in.

OWNERSHIP

9. The owner listed on the entry must be the bona fide owner and continuously own the animal(s) entered as of the entry deadline.
10. Open cattle may be entered by a fitting service but the name of the owner must be listed on the entry. Premium checks will be issued in the name of owner unless the owner notifies Show Management, in writing, that premium checks are to be issued to the fitting service/exhibitor.
11. Prior to or during judging, animal tattoos may be checked by breed association representatives or Show Officials to confirm tattoos match the tattoo listed on the entry form.

CHECK-IN

12. Exhibitors will submit an official check-in form for each animal to be shown. All Open Cattle must be checked-in at the Open Cattle Office prior to the check-in deadline.

BEDDING, STALLS, AND TIE-OUTS

13. **Bedding:** Cattle will be stalled on sand provided by the Arizona National Livestock Show. Straw and shavings may be allowed which will be available for purchase at The Feed Store located Guest Services.

14. **Stalls:** Open cattle stalling is done at time of unloading. Exhibitors wanting to be stalled together must be in the staging lot line together.
15. All cattle must be secured with a rope halter and a neck rope. Stall space is limited to four (4) feet per head.
16. **Tie-outs:** Tie-outs are allowed from 4:30 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. daily. Exhibitors are to provide all bedding for tie-outs. All cattle must be secured with a rope halter and a neck rope. Tie out space is limited to four (4) feet per head. No fitting of animals is allowed at the tie-outs.
17. **Electricity:** Electric generators are restricted to designated outdoor areas. No generators are allowed inside the barns or buildings.

SHOW RING

18. Exhibitors must wear a show number harness when showing animals.
19. All bulls over nine (9) months of age must show with a nose-lead. Any animal deemed unmanageable may be disqualified by the Show Management.

PREMIUMS

20. Classes of **8 head** or more may be split into two (2) classes or more with full premiums paid for those split classes.
21. Without monetary support from a breed association, Arizona National will determine rules regarding Open Cattle Shows.

ARE YOU BOLD?



Boldness is the confidence and courage to do what is right regardless of the circumstances or others' opinions. Bold people are determined, initiating and self-assured. They are seen as leaders.

"Nice" people often hold back, leaving the bold statements and actions to the ones least capable of leading well. Developing appropriate boldness will empower you to be an effective team member and a strong, capable leader. Being bold helps you communicate effectively, persuade powerfully and share ideas.

Without boldness, your valuable input will not be heard. Not speaking up lowers your value to the team and can be discouraging to those who try to move the team forward. Appropriate boldness will allow you to have stronger relationships, more possibilities and increased likelihood of making a difference.



CONTRIBUTE: Boldness requires you to value contribution over convenience and comfort. If you feel you have the skill set to be an effective FFA or 4-H officer, go for it! A bold leader believes in a different and better future.



DON'T LET FEARFUL THOUGHTS CONTROL YOU: Thoughts have the potential to keep us stagnant and delay action. Don't let fear and overthinking keep you from making decisions and moving forward. How will you know how the first show will go until you attend?



HAVE CONFIDENCE: Boldness requires taking risks and being composed in the face of rejection. Does someone think your animal isn't good enough? Respond to their ridicule with hard work. Bold people believe in themselves.



DON'T BE PESSIMISTIC: Discouraging thoughts and assuming the worst will halt your progress toward boldness. Maybe you'll place last in your class, but maybe you'll place third, or even first. Don't allow negativity to hinder your progress toward your goals.



BE PROACTIVE: Followers react and respond, but bold leaders initiate and are bent toward action. If you see an issue in your school or organization, initiate discussion and solutions. Boldness requires being proactive and appropriately aggressive.



DON'T STAY IN YOUR COMFORT ZONE: Avoiding positive change to stay comfortable will cause boldness to fade. Boldness requires branching out and matching your words with action. Accept that you must leave your comfort zone to get what you want.

ELIGIBILITY –

Please Note: beginning at the 2023 Arizona National, the maximum age of a junior exhibitor will be 19 as of January 1, 2023

4. **Age Eligibility:** All Junior Exhibitors must be at least eight (8) years of age and less than twenty-two (22) years of age on January 1, 2022.
5. Exhibitors that have been disqualified from competition with any show that is a member of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Manager's Association are not eligible to enter.

QUALITY ASSURANCE REQUIREMENT

6. All exhibitors in the Junior Show are required to have completed a state or national Quality Assurance training/course such as yqcaprogram.org

LATE ENTRIES

7. Incomplete or late entries will be accepted on the following fee schedule:

LATE FEE SCHEDULE AS FOLLOWS (PER ENTRY):

1-7 days after deadline: \$250.00

8+ days after deadline: \$500.00

ALL OWNERSHIP DEADLINES APPLY

SUBSTITUTION

8. Substitutions will not be allowed in Junior Division shows.

OWNERSHIP

9. The Junior Show is limited to project animals that are owned and cared for by the exhibitor. Junior exhibitors must have continuously owned, been in continuous possession of, and personally cared for their animals from the entry deadline up to and during the Show.
10. To support the integrity of junior livestock projects participating in the Arizona National Livestock Show, animals must be identified by the date of established ownership requirement. Permanent and unalterable identification is to be submitted by junior exhibitors on or before the ownership deadline. By entering and submitting a DNA sample for a market animal, wether dam, wether doe or crossbred breeding gilt, the owner is giving Arizona National Livestock Show authorization and permission to obtain, maintain and analyze DNA samples, retina scans or any other methods of identification on any animal. Conclusions reached by the testing company/ laboratories shall be final, without recourse against the show or its service providers. Arizona National Livestock Show is additionally authorized to share

any identification information with other fairs, livestock shows and state or federal agencies.

11. At any time after the ownership deadline, Market Animals cannot have been offered for sale at a Market Auction at any community, county, state or national livestock show or fair.
12. Junior exhibitors must show their own animal(s). If an exhibitor has more than one (1) animal in a class, they are to find another exhibitor that is currently entered in Arizona National Livestock Show to show their second animal(s). Junior exhibitors must check-in their own animal(s).
13. Junior exhibitors must be present to sell their own animal at each auction for which they qualify.
14. Except where a breed association has specific requirements such as "registration papers must be in the sole name of the exhibitor;" junior show registered breeding livestock (all species) and pedigreed market barrows must be registered in the junior exhibitor's name, the exhibitor's family name, or the exhibitor's farm name, and must be done by December 1, 2022.
15. Immediate family members (exhibitors must legally reside in the same household and are siblings, step siblings, or legally fostered or adopted) are allowed to submit DNA samples and entries on the same animal.
16. The Arizona National reserves the right to use discretion to determine if immediate family members may exhibit the animal of another family member when the animal is rightfully entered and a DNA sample submitted (where applicable) in the event of unforeseen circumstances.

ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION

17. All animals must have secured in one ear, a tamper proof ear tag, imprinted with a nationally unique, official identification number that matches all entries and DNA

kits submitted. The tag must possess the US Shield Emblem or be an 840 or 982 tag.

18. Sheep and goats must be tagged with an official Scrapie ID tag at time of DNA registration and entry. The full (flock and animal #) Scrapie ID tag must be recorded on all entries and DNA kits submitted.
19. Swine must have permanent ear notches (both ears) that reflect the Universal Swine Ear Notch System. Ear notches must be recorded on all entries and DNA kits submitted.

CHECK-IN AND RELEASE

20. Check-In: All junior exhibitors must check-in their own entries at the appropriate Department Barn Office and pick up their exhibitor packet prior to the check-in deadline. Check specific departments for check-in deadline times.
21. Release: Exhibitors and their animals will be released at the conclusion of their respective shows. Please adhere to posted times vehicles are allowed to be inside the show grounds.

WEIGH-IN AND EAR TAGGING

22. Exhibitors must submit a check-in form for each animal to be shown. Only animals with a check-in form submitted by the posted deadline will be allowed to show.
23. Market steers, prospect cattle, market lambs, wether dams, market goats, wether does, market swine and crossbred breeding gilts will declare animal's weight on their check-in form and will not be weighed during check-in. Animals in these classes may be check-weighed during their respective shows.
24. Market steers, lambs, goats and barrows will be ear tagged with an Arizona National ear tag. Exhibitors will tag their own animals.
25. Show Officials must be notified immediately if an animal loses its Arizona National ear tag.

SIFTING

26. Department Superintendents or the Animal Health Committee may sift animals at any time for inferior quality and excessive shrinkage even though the animal made weight. Animals considered uncontrollable may be sifted.

STALLS/PENS

27. All animals in the Junior Show must be stalled in the designated stall or pen during the entire Arizona National Livestock Show.
28. Tie-outs are provided for open and junior cattle. Tie-outs (4' width per head) are allowed from 4:30 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. daily. Exhibitors are to provide all bedding for tie-outs. No fitting of animals is allowed in the tie-outs.
29. Junior livestock stalling is done at time of unloading. Exhibitors wanting to be stalled together must be in the staging lot line together.

FITTING

30. Junior exhibitors may receive assistance, provided the exhibitor is present at all times when assistance is given.

SHOW RING

31. Exhibitors must wear numbers provided by the Arizona National Livestock Show while showing animals in the ring.
32. Animals bearing anything that distracts from the animal's natural appearance will not be allowed in the Arizona National Livestock Show or the sale ring.
33. Junior exhibitors are required to wear appropriate attire in the show ring. Junior exhibitors must be neat, clean and safe,

close toed shoes are required; collared shirts are preferred.

CHAMPION AND RESERVE CHAMPION MARKET ANIMALS

34. Exhibitors of Champion and Reserve Champion market animals may be required to display and handle their animals for photos.
35. Immediately after selection of Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market steer, lamb, goat and barrow, these animals become the property of the Arizona National Livestock Show. Grand and Reserve Champions will be harvested and may undergo further testing.

ELECTRICITY

36. Generators are restricted to designated outdoor areas. No generators are allowed inside the barns or buildings. Electric power is **NOT** available in the Junior Cattle Barns. Electric fans, blowers and clippers may not be used in the Junior Cattle Barns.

LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTESTS

37. Animals entered in the junior show may potentially be used in the Junior and Collegiate Livestock Judging Contests.

ANIMALS OF UNITED STATES ORIGIN

38. Market animals must be bred, born and raised in the United States.

YOUTH EXPERIENCE MEMBERSHIP

39. This membership is for Arizona National Junior Show exhibitors which entitles youth member to discounts at vendors. This membership is **NOT** required for entry into show.

JUNIOR DIVISION DRUG RULES**DRUG**

The term "drug" shall mean any substance the sale, possession, or use of which is regulated by federal, state, or local law or regulation, as well as any substance used by the medical or veterinary professions that affects the circulatory, respiratory, muscular, skeletal or central nervous system of any species of livestock. If drugs are used by the Official Show Veterinarian to treat a recognized disease in market animals, the withdrawal times listed by the drug manufacturer will be strictly followed.

MEDICATION RECEIVED PRIOR TO THE SHOW

Those animals that have consumed or been given, even under the care of a licensed veterinarian, any type of performance enhancing medication, drug, chemical, or substance, including but not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers, are ineligible for competition. Exhibitors with questions regarding medications or eligibility should consult with the official Arizona National Livestock Show Veterinarian prior to competition. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA-approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear the system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal. Adequate time must have passed so that an exhibitor's animal does not test positive for drugs upon arrival. Once the animals arrive on the Arizona State Fairgrounds, they must remain free and clear of all residues included but not limited to medications, drugs, chemicals, and other substances.

MEDICATION DURING THE SHOW

For the convenience of exhibitors, the Arizona National Livestock Show arranges to have veterinarians available; however, they do not donate their services or medications. Fees should be discussed before treatment. Additionally, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to properly communicate to the veterinarians if the animal is eligible for further competition. All medication and treatment administered during the livestock show must be administered by the Official Arizona National Livestock Show Veterinarian and a written medication record must be filed. Animals receiving performance enhancing drugs (including, but not limited to, steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers) in this manner are ineligible for competition. The Official Show Veterinarian, along with Show management, is authorized to remove any animal from competition if the health, safety, or welfare of the animal is in question.

INSPECTION/TESTING:

- a. Each exhibitor, by entering or exhibiting an animal at the Arizona National Livestock Show, agrees that any animal entered by him or her may be subjected to inspection or examination by any veterinarian appointed by the Arizona National Livestock Show and that the Arizona National Livestock Show may subject any such animal to any tests, sample-takings, or inspections that Arizona National Livestock Show deems necessary or appropriate, including but not limited to testing for drugs or other substances, at any time. The Arizona National Livestock Show shall have the right to conduct or have conducted for it all tests, inspections, or analyses it deems appropriate or necessary, including but not limited to ultrasound, DNA, blood, tissue, and urine laboratory analysis, on any animal entered in or exhibited at the Arizona National Livestock Show. The exhibitor or approved substitute exhibitor (and, for Junior exhibitors, the exhibitor's parent, legal guardian, or AST or CEA) must be present during the collection of an initial urine sample for testing and must witness, seal and sign the sample, thereby establishing that the sample was properly collected and prepared for

analysis. Subsequent samples of any sort may be taken by or for Arizona National Livestock Show without the presence of the exhibitor or his or her parent, legal guardian or AST or CEA.

- b. All decisions, determinations, and conclusions based on any test, inspection, analysis, or examination shall be final and conclusive without recourse against Arizona National Livestock Show or any of its officers, directors, volunteers, and employees, or any veterinarian appointed by Arizona National Livestock Show.
- c. Each exhibitor, by entering and exhibiting an animal or project in or at the Arizona National Livestock Show, waives and releases the Arizona National Livestock Show from any and all claims, suits, causes of action, liabilities, damages, demands, costs, expenses (including attorneys' fees), and other losses of every sort based on, arising out of, or relating to the inspection or testing of any such animal and any ruling, decision or action taken as a result of or in reliance on the results of any test or inspection, whether or not such testing or inspection was conducted in compliance with these rules. The foregoing waiver and release applies to any causes of action, claims, and demands based on the Arizona National Livestock Show's actual or alleged negligence.
- d. The initial testing conducted at the election of Arizona National Livestock Show will be paid for by the Show. Payment for any other tests (i.e. testing of split samples, blood typing, etc.) required in the Junior or Open Livestock Show will be the sole responsibility of the exhibitor and at the discretion of the Official Show Veterinarian.

BREEDING ANIMALS

As breeding animals are not entering the food chain, the USDA Wholesome Meat Act does not apply; however, breeding animals will be closely screened for any performance enhancing compounds. This includes, but is not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers.

WHOLESOME ASSURANCE STATEMENT

All exhibitors must read, agree and abide by the Wholesome Assurance Statement in the Premium Book. By certifying an entry each junior exhibitor, exhibitor's parent or legal guardian acknowledges that he/she has read all rules and regulations of the Arizona National Livestock Show premium book, and clearly understands and agrees to abide by all said rules and regulations and the Premium Book in its entirety.

Further, all signatories understand and agree specifically to those rules that define animal testing, DNA requirements and procedures as well as the Wholesome Assurance Statement and USDA Wholesome Meat Act.

WHOLESOME MEAT ACT

The USDA Wholesome Meat Act applies to all market livestock. Only animals eligible for immediate slaughter may be brought onto the grounds and exhibited:

- a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
- b. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
- c. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned. The Arizona National Livestock Show will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of carcasses or the sale price of the animal.

FEDERAL FOOD, DRUG AND COSMETIC ACT

As required in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Market Steer, Junior Market Goat, Junior Market Lamb, and Junior Market Barrow Show shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct

control, the animal(s) were not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.

CONSEQUENCES OF UNETHICAL DRUG USE

In the event that Arizona National Livestock Show determines any animal to be in violation of show drug rules, the Executive Committee is authorized to disqualify the exhibitor and his or her animal and may permanently bar the exhibitor and his or her family from any further participation in the Arizona National Livestock Show. Reinstatement of any barred exhibitor may be made only by the Executive Committee. The exhibitor will forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums and scholarships if the animal or exhibitor is disqualified. Market/Floor money will be forfeited if the animal is condemned at slaughter or deemed un-merchantable. The Arizona National Livestock Show, in cooperation with member shows of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association, reserves the right to submit the name(s) of any disqualified exhibitor to the organization's Rule Infraction Database. The Arizona National Livestock Show reserves the exclusive right to categorize drug use in one of the categories listed below. If an animal is disqualified, changes will not be made to the placings of other animals

CONSEQUENCES OF POSITIVE DRUG SAMPLE RESIDUE

Arizona National Drug Classification	Consequence
Category 1 – Drugs that are labeled for use in that species and have established withdrawal times	Any drug residue found that is labeled for that specie will result in immediate disqualification for current year show and forfeiture of premiums/auction money. Exhibitors will be banned for three (3) years with opportunity for appeal and re-admittance after suspension. Exhibitors who are re-admitted and whose animals are found to have Category 1 drug residues a second time will be immediately disqualified from the current show, forfeit premium/auction money and be banned from all future shows.
Category 2 – Drugs/substances that are not labeled/approved for use in that species (includes, but is not limited to: caffeine, marijuana, phenylbutazone)	Any drug/substance residue found that is not approved for use constitutes immediate disqualification from current show and lifetime ban from future shows, forfeiture of premiums/auction money.

The Arizona National Livestock Show supports and endorses the Wholesome Assurance Statement as listed below. The Arizona National Livestock Show is a zero tolerance show and as such has adopted a more stringent policy with regard to actionable levels of drugs, pesticides, feed additives or other chemicals.

WHOLESOME ASSURANCE STATEMENT

- The use of animal drugs or other substances by non-veterinarians in any manner other than in accordance with the labeling approved by FDA, is a violation of federal law. *
- Any food animal must not exceed FDA/EPA/USDA established tolerances for any foreign substance (identified or unidentified), including drugs, pesticides, feed additives, or other chemicals.
- Violative results of residue testing are subject to investigation by USDA and FDA for prosecution.
- Any misrepresentation of a food animal that can potentially affect the acceptability of the carcass or milk will be considered fraud.
- Manual of Meat Inspection: The Manual of Meat Inspection Procedures of the USDA states that carcasses must be free of actionable levels of antibiotics, hormones, or pesticide-chemicals to pass as safe and wholesome food. Detection of illegal residues of these substances may lead to stiff penalties on the part of the producer. Therefore, label instructions, precautions, warnings, and withdrawal periods must be carefully followed.

** Note: Abuse of the extra-label privilege by veterinarians is unethical and is subject to serious consequences such as license revocation.*

Drug withdrawal periods must be completed prior to arrival at the show.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

AS ADOPTED BY THE ARIZONA NATIONAL LIVESTOCK SHOW

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all junior livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the Code of Ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds, and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this Code of Ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

THE FOLLOWING IS A LIST OF POLICIES FOR ALL JUNIOR EXHIBITORS AND ALL JUNIOR LIVESTOCK IN COMPETITIVE EVENT

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show, in events where they will enter the food chain, free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
5. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other samples taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
6. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by an Arizona National Livestock Show approved licensed veterinarian.
7. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
8. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
9. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the

competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

10. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this Code of Ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code of Ethics.
11. The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics.
12. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be shared with other fairs, livestock shows and organizations of fairs or livestock shows.
13. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read this National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by this code. It is further a consent that any action which

contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.



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JUNIOR ANIMAL DNA REGISTRATION

Each junior market steer, market wether lamb, market goat, market barrow, wether dam, wether doe and crossbred gilt showing at the Arizona National Livestock Show **MUST** submit a complete DNA sample envelope along with official online entry and fees.

DNA REGISTRATION DEADLINE

1. DNA samples are required for all market animals (steers, lambs, goats and pigs) as well as wether dams, wether does and crossbred gilts.
2. DNA kits must be purchased online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/ DNA kits sales open July 1.
3. The DNA Registration deadline for all entries is **NOVEMBER 1**.
4. DNA samples must be received by the Arizona National Livestock Show Office on or before the deadline **OR** be postmarked by a U.S. Post Office on or before the deadline. Postage meter postmarks are **NOT** considered postmarked by the Post Office.
5. Incomplete or late DNA samples may be accepted on the following fee schedule (per kit/entry):
1-7 days after deadline: \$250.00
8+ days after deadline: \$500.00
ALL OWNERSHIP DEADLINES WILL STILL APPLY
***exhibitor will pay a separate late fee for each entry as well as a late fee for each DNA submission.**
6. **DNA kits will not be sold after November 1.**
7. We strongly recommend exhibitors acquire a tracking number from the service used to mail/deliver DNA kits.

DNA REGISTRATION ENTRIES

8. There is no limit on the number of animals entered and on the number of DNA registrations submitted in a specific exhibitor's name.
9. A maximum of four (4) market steers; two (2) market wether lambs; two (2)

market goats; and/or two (2) market barrows are eligible to be checked in and shown in that specific exhibitor's name in which the animal was entered under and a DNA sample was received. Exhibitors may show all four species in the same year.

DNA REGISTRATION PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS

10. DNA samples are to be collected into a **CURRENT YEAR** Arizona National Livestock Show DNA sample envelope. All information and signatures on envelope must be complete and legible.
11. A separate DNA sample from each animal entered must be submitted in a sealed official current year Arizona National Livestock Show DNA sample envelope.
12. A separate DNA sample and entry must be submitted by each exhibitor of an immediate family entering the animal. (e.g. family members, A and B, both entering animal #1; A and B must each complete an online entry and A and B must each submit a DNA sample for animal #1)
13. **Online Entries must be completed at:** www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/ by 11:59 p.m., (Arizona time) November 1. Online entries open October 1.
14. Exhibitors will be notified in writing if their entry and/or DNA submission is rejected.
15. All DNA samples become the property of the Arizona National Livestock Show and will not be returned.
16. The Arizona National Livestock Show reserves the right to refuse any DNA registration or entry for any reason.

1. All Junior Swine Show rules apply.
2. **Selection of Gilts for Sale and Determination of Sale Order:** A minimum of 20 purebred gilts and 20 crossbred gilts will be selected for the sale. A maximum of 60 gilts will be selected for the sale. Gilts selected for the sale will be identified in the show ring during their respective show (i.e. Purebred Gilt Show, Crossbred Gilt Show). Sale order will be determined by the Judge and Gilt Sale Committee immediately following conclusion of the Crossbred Gilt Show and will not be final until 30 minutes after the conclusion of the Crossbred Gilt Show. A complete sale order will be posted after selection is complete.
3. **The following gilts are required to sell:** Overall Champion Purebred, Overall Reserve Champion Purebred, all Breed Champions, Champion Crossbred, Reserve Champion Crossbred. Reserve Breed Champions may be required to sell.
4. **Additional Gilts Required to Sell:** The judge and Gilt Sale Committee shall determine which additional gilts will sell, if selected exhibitor's gilt must go through the sale. No substitutions.
5. **Gilt Sale commission:** the commission fee is 12%. This amount will be deducted from payment amounts made to consignors. A 12% buy-back commission will be charged to all consignors who 'buy-back' their own animals through the sale. If an exhibitor intends to purchase (buy back) their consigned gilt, they must register as a buyer using their own name.
6. If an animal is selected and cataloged for the sale by the Sale Committee and the animal does not go through the sale ring, the consignor will be banned from participating at the Arizona National Livestock Show for three (3) years and will be charged a 20% commission fee of the average sale price. If the Show Veterinarian provides a written statement releasing the gilt from going through the sale due to injury or illness, the gilt will be scratched from the sale. The veterinary statement must be provided to the Swine Show Superintendent no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the sale.
7. The Arizona National Livestock Show acts only as the agent between the buyer and the seller. Payments to consignors will be completed after buyers' payments have cleared.
8. The auctioneer's decision is final on any disputed bids. In the event of any disputes, the Arizona National swine committee will arbitrate and settle all claims.
9. The Show Veterinarian will be available to provide necessary vet inspection papers and other required health documents. Veterinarian fees are the responsibility of the buyer.
10. After the successful sale of an animal, the new owner becomes responsible for the care, management and removal of said animal. All animals must be removed from the grounds no later than 4:00 p.m., January 1.
11. All buyers must be registered with the sale clerk. All payments must be made in full on the day of the sale. All gilts must have an official release before leaving the grounds. Terms are cash, check or credit card (Visa, Master Card or Discover only). **Credit card purchases require card pre-authorization.** Checks and credit cards require a valid and current driver license. Credit card transactions are subject to a 4% credit card transaction fee.
12. Gilt consignors and one parent/guardian/supervisor must attend a mandatory sale meeting in the Swine Arena immediately following the Crossbred Gilt Show (time to be announced).
13. All Purebred Gilt Sale Consignors must submit original registration papers, with signatures, to the Swine Show Superintendent's Office by 3:00 p.m., on the day of the sale.
14. Gilts sell "as is." The nationally recognized "Code of Fair Practice" is understood by both sellers and buyers. A copy of the code can be found on the NSR website at:

9. Each team member must be a certified full-time student carrying twelve (12) or more units/credits of college work during the previous fall semester and be enrolled in a minimum of twelve (12) or more units/credits of college work for the upcoming spring semester. Team members must also be eligible under the rules established by the Junior College Coaches Association.

SENIOR COLLEGE DIVISION

10. Open to teams from any four-year college having a full-time agriculture department.
11. Each institution may enter one team of six (6) members. The five (5) individuals with the highest total scores will count for the team total. All participants in the contest will be eligible for individual awards. There is no limit to the number of individuals above the team that can compete as individuals.
12. Contestants must be undergraduate students regularly enrolled in a four-year course leading to a degree equivalent to a

bachelor of Science and taking twelve (12) or more semester units/credits in the previous fall semester and enrolled in a minimum of twelve (12) or more units/credits for the upcoming spring semester

13. Team members shall not have competed in previous senior collegiate judging contests.

CONTEST RULES

14. Entries must be submitted to the Arizona National Livestock Show Office with fees by the entry deadline, December 27. Entries can be completed online at www.anls.org/show-entry-portal/ The completed entry with the advisor/coach signature will certify the Official has read the contest rules and verified the eligibility of each contestant. 15. Individual contestants are only allowed from schools with teams competing in the Junior College or Senior College Divisions.
16. No person will be eligible for this contest who has served as an Animal Science Instructor in a junior or senior college or who has served as a judge for a college livestock judging contest.

17. Uniforms, school colors, or other methods which identify the contestant's school are not allowed during the contest.

18. Contestants and coaches will NOT be permitted on the grounds after the coaches meeting which will take place immediately following the final workout session.

19. Coaches must attend the coaches' meeting. At this meeting, contestants will be confirmed. If this meeting is not attended, contestants may not be allowed to compete.

20. No practice judging classes may be set up by judging team coaches without prior permission from Arizona National Livestock Show officials. Contestants are encouraged to watch various livestock shows and participate in judging workouts provided.

21. Coaches will not be permitted to examine classes prior to completion of evaluation by contestants, unless invited to serve in an official capacity by Arizona National Livestock Show officials.

The official who signed the entry form certifying the eligibility of an ineligible contestant may not be allowed to enter teams in subsequent years.
 23. All contestants will compete in the individual rotations and participate in group rotations. Only the three highest member scores will be used from the individual rotations and both scores from the team rotations will be counted for team awards. Contestants competing as individuals will participate in the team rotations and scores may be counted toward their individual scores.  24. Only contestants and Contest Officials are permitted in the Livestock Skill-A-Thon area during competition.
 25. Coaches and other adults will not be permitted to examine rotations prior to completion of evaluation by contestants, unless invited to serve in an official capacity by Arizona National Livestock Show Officials.
 26. Contestants cannot confer with each other or their coach at any time during the individual rotations of the contest. Youth contestants must understand that they are required to be silent during the individual rotations. Talking is permitted amongst team members during team rotations only. Violators of this rule will be disqualified. Clean notebooks are allowed. Questions must be directed to Contest Officials only.
 27. Contestants are encouraged to wear closed-toed shoes/boots for safety.
 28. Rule violations will cause disqualification, forfeiture of all awards, and the possibility of being barred from future competition.

OBJECTIVE

1. The objective of the Arizona National Ranch Replacement Heifer Show and Sale is to provide an opportunity for Southwestern cattle ranchers to showcase the best replacement females representing their genetic program and its superior offering of heifers that are Southwestern raised and “rock footed.” These cattle will work in tough environments and produce calves each year that fit real world agriculture. All cattle will be subjected to a rigorous pre-show sift to guarantee a standard of perfection and soundness required by any cattle buyer.

ENTRIES

FEES

Pen of 3: \$75

Pen of 5: \$50

2. A completed entry form and fees are due by **December 1**.
3. Entry is a pen of three (3) or five (5) ranch raised, commercial replacement quality heifers. Heifers may be either purebred or crossbred. Entry is open to southwestern-raised cattle from southwestern-owned ranches.

Four Divisions will be offered:

Division 6025: European and British Breeds; Bred Heifers (purebreds and/or crossbreds); females 15-36 months of age on or before December 31, 2022. Consignors must provide pregnancy verification signed by an accredited, non-owner, licensed veterinarian at the time females are processed at the show.

Division 6026: European and British Breeds; Open Heifers (purebreds and/or

crossbreds), females 12-24 months of age on or before December 31, 2022.

Division 6027: American Breeds; Bred Heifers (purebreds, crossbreds and F1s); females 15-36 months of age on or before December 31, 2022. Consignors must provide pregnancy verification signed by an accredited, non-owner, licensed veterinarian at the time females are processed at the show.

Division 6028: American Breeds; Open Heifers (purebreds, crossbreds and F1's), Females 12-24 months of age on or before December 31, 2022.

4. **Note:** There will be a limit of twenty (20) pens accepted for entry. Entries and fees received after pen space is full will be returned. Entries submitted early have a greater chance of being accepted.
5. All heifers in a pen must be raised by the ranch; all carry the same brand and display a permanent Arizona National Livestock Show ear tag. Exhibitors will be sent a confirmation along with official Arizona National Livestock Show ear tags and credentials after close of entry deadline.
6. Each pen of heifers will be housed in the same pen.
7. Cattle are shown in their “work clothes,” **NO FITTING ALLOWED**. This includes clipping, washing and trimming hoofs.
8. Ranches are responsible for feed and care of the heifers while on the grounds. Ranches are to provide their own feed and water troughs/buckets and hoses.

JUDGING

9. Pens will be judged as one (1) entry.
10. The Judges will select a Champion Pen and a Reserve Champion Pen for each Division. A Grand Champion Pen and Reserve Grand Champion Pen will be selected. Final sale offering and order will be determined by the Ranch Replacement Heifer Show Committee.

AUCTION

11. All pens of heifers will sell at auction. No private treaty sales are allowed for heifers entered in this Show.
12. Sale order will be determined by the Auctioneer and Sale Committee.
13. Heifers are to be sold as a pen and sold on a per head basis.
14. A 5% commission is charged on all sales and will be deducted from sale proceeds.
15. Terms of Sale are cash or check. Payment is to be made to the clerk on the day of the Auction. A valid driver's license is required as identification for all checks.
16. All sales are final and binding.
17. Consignors will receive their checks through the mail as soon as possible after the close of the Show.
18. All representations, including but not limited to, breeding, soundness, fertility, health and vaccinations, are made by the consignor and not by the Arizona National.
19. Cattle will be housed in pens with straw for bedding.
20. All cattle must be safe to handle under normal cattle, close quarters, sorting conditions.

EVALUATION

21. All heifers must be a minimum of 500 lbs. each as of show day and must have been weaned at least forty-five (45) days.
22. Vaccination requirements for all heifers beyond standard health rules of the Arizona National Livestock Show requirements are: All cattle **MUST** be treated and in accordance with a VAC 45 program and proper documentation certifying compliance must be provided at check-in.

All cattle **MUST** be calf hood vaccinated with an approved Brucella *abortus* RB-51 vaccine between 4-12 months of age. Official calf hood vaccination ID must be evident for all heifers and in compliance with federal and state regulations. All other ANLS health rules apply.
23. All cattle must be approved by the Arizona Ranch Replacement Heifer Show Committee. The Committee shall perform a rigorous quality sift prior to the actual judging and cattle may be disqualified if quality standards are not consistent with real life commercial ranching environments within Arizona and the Southwest. Soundness and disposition will be evaluated.
24. It is agreed and understood by the exhibitor that as a result of entry, all females entered in this show are subject to a pregnancy check performed by an Arizona licensed veterinarian after arrival and prior to the start of judging. Results of the pregnancy check will be provided to the owner, judges and potential buyers. Pregnancy checks will be performed by a veterinarian selected by the Committee.

ALL GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS, OPEN CATTLE RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND CATTLE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS APPLY

OBJECTIVE

1. The objective of the Arizona National Commercial Ranch Bull Show and Sale is to provide an opportunity for Southwestern cattle ranchers to showcase their genetic program offering bulls that are Southwestern raised and “rock footed.” These cattle will work in tough Southwest environments and fit real world agriculture. All cattle will be subjected to a rigorous pre-show sift to guarantee a standard of perfection and soundness required by any cattle buyer.

ENTRY FEE \$100/hd

ENTRIES

2. A completed entry form and fees are due by **December 1**.
3. Bulls may be either purebred or crossbred. Entry is open to Southwestern-raised cattle from Southwestern-owned ranches.
4. There will be a limit of twenty (20) bulls accepted for entry. Entries and fees received after pen space is full will be returned.
5. All bulls must be raised by the ranch and display a permanent Arizona National Livestock Show ear tag. Exhibitors will be sent a confirmation along with official Arizona National Livestock Show ear tags and credentials after close of entry deadline.
6. Bulls must be semen and Trich tested sixty (60) days prior to the show. Consignors must provide a Breeding Soundness Exam from an accredited, non-owner, licensed veterinarian at the time bulls are processed at the show. Bulls must be virgins.

7. Cattle are shown in their “work clothes,” **NO FITTING ALLOWED**. This includes clipping, washing and trimming hoofs.
8. Ranches are responsible for feed and care of bulls while on the grounds. Ranches are to provide their own feed and water troughs/buckets and hoses.

JUDGING

9. Bulls will be judged individually.
10. A Grand Champion Bull and Reserve Grand Champion Bull will be selected.

AUCTION

11. All bulls will sell at auction. No private treaty sales prior to the auction are allowed for bulls entered in this show. All sales are final.
12. Final Sale offering and sale order will be determined by the Auctioneer and Sale Committee.
13. Bulls will be sold on a per head basis.
14. A 5% commission is charged on all sales and will be deducted from sale proceeds.
15. Terms of Sale are cash or check. Payment is to be made to the clerk on the day of the Auction. A valid driver's license is required as identification for all checks.
17. Consignors will receive their checks through the mail as soon as possible after the close of the show.
18. All representations, including but not limited to, breeding, soundness, fertility, health and vaccinations, are made by the consignor and not by the Arizona National.
19. Cattle will be housed in pens with straw for bedding.
20. All cattle must be safe to handle under normal cattle, close quarters, sorting conditions.

EVALUATION

21. All bulls must be a minimum of 900 lbs. each as of show day and must have been weaned at least sixty (60) days.
22. Vaccination requirements for all bulls beyond standard health rules of the Arizona National Livestock Show requirements are: All cattle **MUST** be treated and in accordance with a VAC 45 program and proper documentation certifying compliance must be provided at check-in.

23. All cattle must be approved by the Arizona National Ranch Commercial Bull Show Committee. The Committee shall perform a rigorous quality sift prior to the actual judging and cattle may be disqualified if quality standards are not consistent with real life commercial ranching environments within Arizona and the Southwest. Soundness and disposition will be evaluated.

Awards and Premiums

All consignors and registered buyers (and their immediate family members) will receive a complimentary Cattlemen's Day Lunch on December 29.

DEPARTURE DEADLINE: Livestock must be removed by 4:00 p.m., January 1, 2023

The objective of the Arizona Working Ranch Horse Competition is to provide a contest for horses from true working cattle ranches in Arizona. Entries for the event will be by invitation only. Only Arizona ranches whose primary interest is the production of beef cattle and horses will be invited. The Arizona National Livestock Show reserves the right to accept or reject any entry at its sole discretion.

ENTRIES

1. Entries and fees must be received in the Arizona National Livestock Show Office on or before **December 1**.
2. Entry fee is \$100.00 per horse; 100% of entry fees collected will be added to the payout jackpot.
3. Entries are limited to one (1) horse per ranch. Additional entries from the same ranch will be considered if the entry limit has not been met after ten (10) days following the entry deadline.
4. A maximum of fifteen (15) entries will be accepted.
5. The contest is open to horses of any sex, age or breed. Horses need not be registered with a breed association. The horse must be primarily used on the ranch for ranch work. Horses cannot have been shown in a sanctioned horse show within the past twelve (12) months. Horse ownership must be in the name of the ranch, the ranch owner or an employee of the ranch. All horses must show proof of a

negative Coggins test within the last twelve (12) months.

6. Rider must be an owner, partner or employee of the ranch. Rider cannot be a professional horse trainer.
7. All contestants must sign a Release of Liability before the event.
8. No bell boots, skid boots, splint boots or romals may be used.

CONTEST FORMAT

Each horse will perform the below described routine. Each horse will have a six (6) minute time limit. The judges and/or committee may alter the events at their sole discretion. Judging and time will begin when the horse enters the arena. Order of go will be determined by a draw immediately prior to the contest.

9. The contestant will enter the arena mounted on his/her horse and immediately go into the reining pattern (see diagram; pattern is subject to change). Starting with a large circle and a half to the left, change leads and circle to the right once, change leads and circle to

the left once, and then change leads again for one final circle to the right. There are a total of three (3) lead changes.

10. Without stopping after finishing the figure 8's, turn left and lope down the arena fence closest to the grandstand and stop and roll back on the fence to the right and lope down the fence at least seventy-five (75) feet, stop and roll back to the left. After the roll back to the left, stop and back the horse up at least fifteen (15) feet. Then lope into the middle of the arena and stop, and then spin the horse one turn each direction.

11. Upon completion of the reining pattern, the rider will call for a cow to be turned out of a corral. The cow should be turned several times or boxed at that end of the arena and then put on the fence and turned back once each way. The rider will then rope the cow by the neck and then have another contestant of his/her choice heel the cow. The contestant must then remove the neck rope and put it on both front feet and demonstrate how the horse will hold it while the contestant is dismounted. This will complete this portion of the Ranch Horse Competition.

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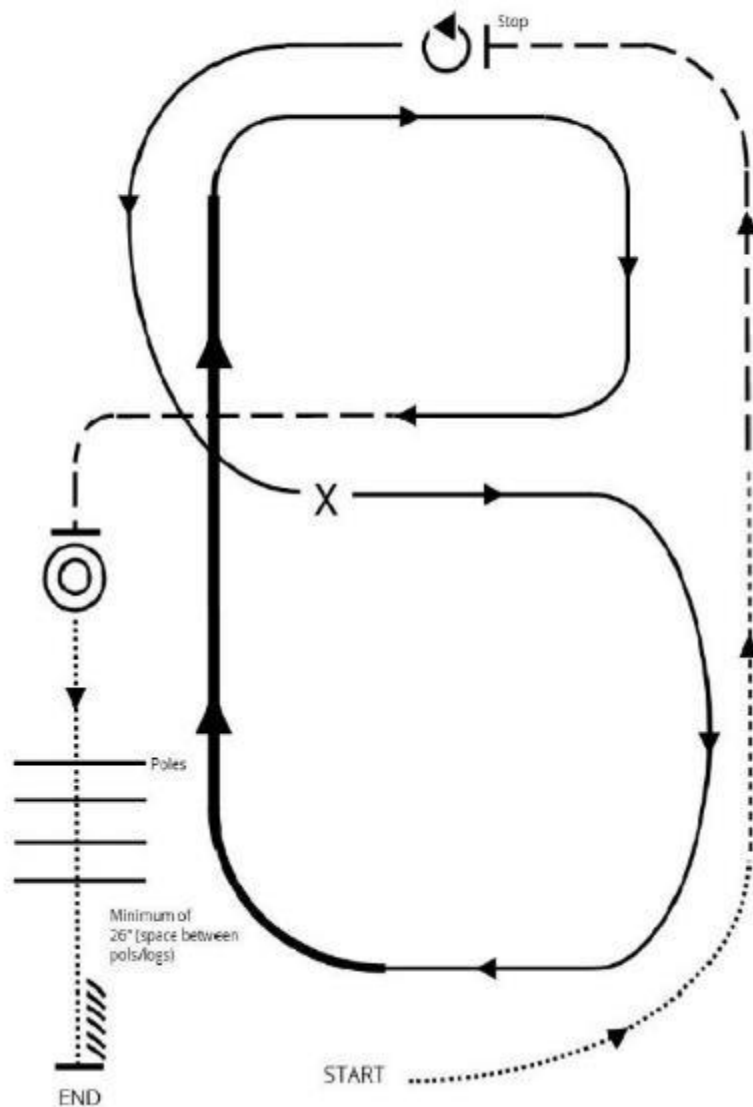


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WORKING RANCH HORSE COMPETITION PATTERN



DESCRIPTION

- 1) Walk
- 2) Trot
- 3) Extend the trot, at the top of the arena, stop
- 4) 360° turn to the left
- 5) Left lead 1/2 circle, lope to the center
- 6) Change leads (simple or flying)
- 7) Right lead 1/2 circle
- 8) Extended lope up the long side of the arena (right lead)
- 9) Collect back to a lope around the top of the arena and back to center
- 10) Break down to an extended trot
- 11) Halt, and perform one full (360°) turn around each direction
- 12) Walk over poles
- 13) Stop and back

ENTRIES

1. Entries and fees must be received in the Arizona National Livestock Show Office on or before **December 1** or to the first 30 open dogs, first 10 intermediate dogs and first 20 nursery dogs entered.
2. Entry fee is \$100.00 per dog, per day for open dogs and \$75.00 per dog, per day for intermediate and nursery dogs.
3. OPEN DIVISION: Any dog of any age may compete in the Open division. An Open handler is an advanced handler and may also compete in the Nursery Division.
4. INTERMEDIATE DIVISION: Open to handlers not competing in the Open Division. Any dog may compete in the Intermediate Division.
5. NURSERY DIVISION: Only dogs that are younger than 30 months (2.5 years) at the beginning of the qualifying season (April 1st) are eligible to compete in the Nursery Division, e.g., for the 2022-2023 trial year, eligible dogs must have been born on or after October 1st, 2019. Any handler may compete in the nursery class.
6. All dogs entering Arizona need a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) with the following requirements:
 - a. Issued by an accredited Veterinarian
 - b. Issued within 30 days of travel to event
 - c. Must have an original signature
 - d. Must document that the animal is currently vaccinated against Rabies.For more information go to:

7. The Arizona National Livestock Show has initiated a Biosecurity Protocol for Animal Health inspections and treatment policies related to general health concerns. This protocol will utilize Arizona licensed veterinary care and if necessary, removal of animal that is determined to be a possible detriment to other animals, exhibitors or the public.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

CONTEST FORMAT

The 2022 Arizona National Livestock Show Cattledog Trials will run 30 Open dogs, 10 Intermediate dogs and 20 Nursery dogs.

- Open – Top 1/3 will compete in the finals. Dogs will be selected by combining the placings from day 1 and 2. Overall awards will be determined from performance in the final round. In the event that finals cannot be held, the lowest combined placings will be tabulated for overall awards. In the event of a tie, the lowest combined times from day 1 and 2 will be used. In the event that these times are the same, the times from when the cattle cross the time barrier will be used.
- Intermediate and Nursery – cumulative finals will be calculated based on performances from day 1 and 2.

FARM EXPERIENCE LIL BUCKAROO RODEO

ENTRIES

1. Entry Fee is \$20 and must be paid at time of entry. Entry fee is **NON-REFUNDABLE**.
2. Entries are taken at the Arizona National Livestock Show Guest Services booth. Entries close one (1) hour prior to each performance.
3. A maximum of thirty (30) entries will be accepted per performance.
4. Riders can weigh no more than sixty (60) pounds and will be weighed just prior to riding. A scale will be available at the Guest Services booth.

GENERAL RULES

5. All riders' parents/guardian must sign a liability waiver.
6. No riggings are allowed.
7. Riders are allowed, but not required, to use two hands during their ride.
8. Western attire is recommended but not required. No spurs are allowed.
9. The competition is overseen by a timekeeper and ring judge who will record the time of the ride from the moment the rider and sheep exit the chute to the moment the rider touches the ground. The riders are ranked based on the longest ride.

Riders are automatically capped at 45 seconds. Re-rides, in the case of a tie or other extenuating circumstances, are at the discretion of the ring judge.

10. No exhibition rides allowed at final competition.
11. No parents allowed behind bucking chutes.
12. All riders must wear a safety helmet and have the option of wearing a protective vest. Helmet and vest will be provided by the Arizona National Livestock Show.
13. All contestants who compete receive a ribbon.

PRELIMINARY ROUNDS

Li'l Buckaroo Rodeo performances will be open to 4-, 5- and 6-year old riders on a first come, first serve basis, with a maximum of thirty (30) contestants per performance.

ENTRIES

1. Entry Fee is \$20 per person and must be paid at time of entry. Entry fee is **NON-REFUNDABLE**.
2. Entries are taken at the Arizona National Livestock Show Guest Services booth. Entries close one (1) hour prior to each performance.
3. A maximum of fifteen (15) teams will be accepted per performance.
4. Team Goat Roping is open to teams of all ages. Contestants who win a performance are not eligible to compete in later performances.

GENERAL RULES

5. All competitors or their parents/guardian must sign a liability waiver.
6. Each team shall designate a header and a heeler.
7. Western attire is recommended but not required. No spurs are allowed.
8. The competition is overseen by a timekeeper and a judge. The judge will determine if the animal does not have enough lead time. In the event that an animal does not have enough lead time, a rerun may be awarded at the discretion of the Event Chairperson. A time will be awarded when each roper faces the other and the ropes are taut. After 60

seconds an automatic no-time will be given.

9. A legal head catch will consist of either:
1) around both horns; or 2) around the neck. A legal heel catch consists of one or both hind legs. Behind both shoulders is legal if the rope goes up the heels. The judge has final discretion on all catches and questioned calls.
10. Each team will be given two runs. The fastest of the two runs will be used to determine the winner.
11. No exhibition runs allowed.
12. Only competitors will be allowed in the arena and in the boxes.
13. Ropes will be provided for contestants to use to compete with. Personal ropes are also permitted.

Team Goat Roping will take place in the Farm Experience Area.

timekeeper when the rope breaks away from the saddle and a time will be given. Judge will determine if the animal does not have enough lead time.

9. No exhibition runs allowed.
10. Only competitors will be allowed in the arena and in the boxes.
11. Ropes will be provided for contestants to use to compete with. Contestants are also permitted to use their own ropes.

Goat Roping will take place in the Farm Experience Arena.

Top five (5) fastest times in each age group from each performance on December 28 and December 29 will return to compete in the Goat Roping Finals.
